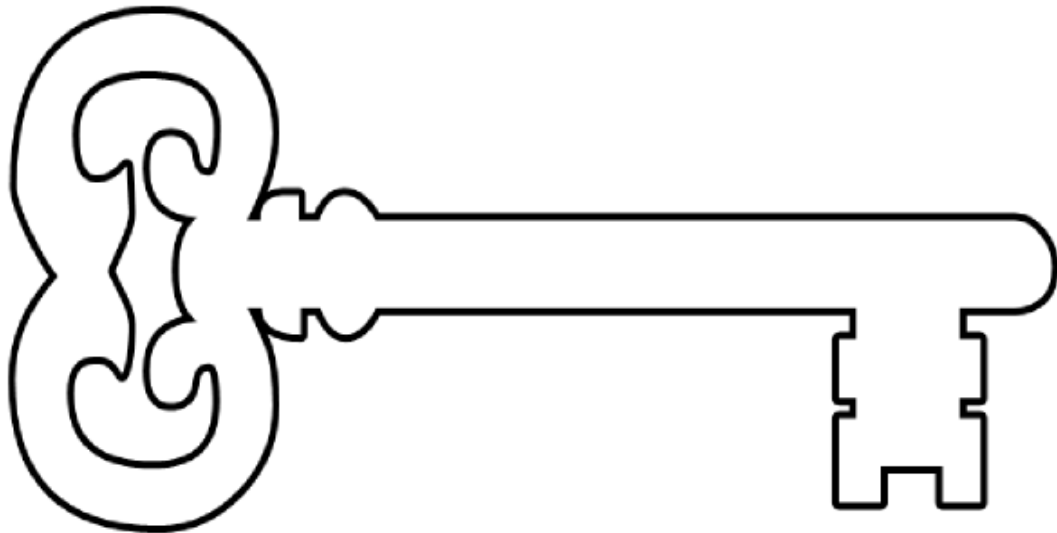

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Lecturers' Tips

A good Lecturer will:

- Present a program at most meetings
- Select the open and closing songs at Grange meetings
- Take an active role in yearly Grange program planning
- Encourage all members to participate in program/events
- Encourage participation in State Lecturer's contests/events
- Submit reports requested by the State Lecturer
- Have a "back-up plan" for every program
- Ask your Grange Services Chair to give an update during your program time.

A good Grange program is:

- Well organized
- Includes R.I.M.E (Recreation, Inspiration, Music, Education) but not necessarily in equal portions
 1. Recreation means games, jokes, activity, exercise
 2. Inspiration is uplifting poems, quotations, stories, speakers
 3. Music can be sung, instrumental, recorded
 4. Education is factual or informative material, speakers, visual
- Lasts between 20 and 30 minutes at a business meeting
- Involves as many members as possible
- Limit readings/poems to no more than 2.

Avoid plagiarism:

- Always give credit to authors and sources
- Include the website if you use internet material
- Be careful about using copyrighted material without permission of the author, especially in printed booklets or on websites

Choose a Theme for your year or meeting (optional)

- Pick a theme and plan your program around that subject.
- A theme can give you ideas for program topics, prizes, speakers, music and activities.
- Use the theme for your fair exhibit or Grange Week display

Others can present a "Lecturer's Program":

- Standing Committees may have a special "night" or program
- Bring in a speaker on a topic of interest to your Grange.
- Invite another Grange to visit and "bring the program".
- Train your successor by letting another Grange member do the program some evening.

LET'S GET STARTED: Suggestions for a complete program

1. Select a Theme or Topic for your program
2. Find an opening. It can be a thought, song, game or other to set the mood and "Theme" for the entire program. You can also explain your choice of theme.
3. Find information, articles, games, skits, tableau's, etc. to carry the theme through the program.
4. Collect all the information together. Make a couple of selections, 2 of each of the above items that best suit what you want to convey in your program.
5. Organize the material you want to use. Which item will be 1st, 2nd, etc.
6. Write a short script for yourself to introduce each item you have chosen.
7. If you are asking members to participate, approach them before the beginning of the meeting.
8. Find a closing. (End with something uplifting or thought provoking rather than something depressing or negative.) Choose from some of the material you have collected already or find something additional. Again it can be a thought, song, game or other to "wrap up" the mood and "theme" for the entire program. Leave them with a smile on their face.
9. Make enough copies of the items for others to read, find all extra props and/or costumes. Put everything together in one place to take with you to the meeting.
10. Remember: You don't always have to start with the opening "thought" and end with a closing "thought", that is what I mean by mix things up some. Use other items for opening and closing.

Program ideas:

- 1) Newspaper: give each member a page of the paper and ask them to find something to share and discuss. It could be of local, state or national interest.
- 2) Survey your members to find out their interests.
- 3) Survey your members to find out their talents. Ask one of them to bring their talent in and share or teach. Have they been on a trip and can share photos? Have they read a book and can tell about it?
- 4) Invite a local selectmen, city council member, sheriff, etc to speak of local concerns.
- 5) Have someone from your community kitchen or local food bank or food shelf talk about the needs of the community. Do a food drive to donate to them when they come to your meeting.
- 6) Talk with the committee chairs of your grange. There are ideas in their programs that they could do at a meeting.
- 7) Do a sentence starter, such as: My favorite childhood memory was..... I would love to visit.....
- 8) Grange history. Not just the seven founders, but who founded your local grange? Who were the charter members? Are there any of their descendants still in your area?
- 9) History of your town or state.
- 10) Use state attraction maps you pick up at rest areas. Give each person or group a county or area and have them tell what there is to do there.
- 11) Use a CD of music and play name that tune. Or look through a Grange Song book and read a couple of lines for them to guess the song.
- 12) Bingo: make up your own bingo cards at www.dltk-cards.com/bingo/
- 13) Ag in the classroom newsletter at: www.agclassroom.org/nh
- 14) Readers theater

The following is from a Program workshop at the 2016 Northeast Lecturers Conference. A subject was given and groups came up with the following ideas that you could use to plan a program. The areas used were recreation (R) (games, jokes, activity, exercise), Inspiration (I) (uplifting poems, quotations, stories, speakers), Music (M) (can be sung, instrumental, recorded), and Education (E) (factual or informative material, speakers, visual).

Subject: Snowflakes

R: skiing, sledding, tobogganing, building a snowman, snowball throwing, build a fort

I: movies (White Christmas), poetry, church

M: Christmas songs, "Let it Snow", "Frosty the Snowman"

E: a talk about Snowflake Bentley, weather conditions, weather man, how to clear snow safely.

Subject: American Flag

R: Create own American flag out of paper, quilt for a Junior project, use an older design or present one

I: Speaker-either on American Flag or Betsy Ross, search internet- importance to era-wars

M: sign American songs- local band to play songs

E: speaker-how the flag was first started, who, when, why (search internet)

Subject: Music

R: pianist/cd play Grange songs, musical chairs, bulletin with art projects made from old board sheet music, music symbols

I: how music pulls people together

M: sign an old song from the song book, play cd's/play instruments

E: basic on copyrighting information, history of Caroline Hall-first song book published, music teacher as a speaker

Subject: Bugs/insects (possible Program title "Birds & the Bees")

R: Cootie game

I: Poems about butterflies "If you think little things don't matter, spend a night with a mosquito in your room"

M: "Itsy Bitsy Spider", "Flight of the Bumble Bee", "Bumble Bee"-Kids

E: speakers- Bee Keeper, Health Professional speak on Lyme Disease, on what to play for a butterfly garden, exterminator, Mosquito diseases-Zika, West Nile, etc., google information

Subject: Grange History

R: game-name the 7 Founders, Play or skit about legislation about Railroads, Mail, word search using Grange words

I: Famous quotes like Susan B Anthony, quotes of founding Fathers

M: Use Grange songs in Patron book, sign a song, use songs used in degrees, which we don't use often because of new Welcoming ceremony.

E: information on founding Fathers, Niece Carolyn Hall, roll call favorite traditions, what Grange means to me, What I have learned/ been taught in/by the Grange.

Subject: Christmas

R: grab bags to exchange, that can be stolen, for a time or choose a new one. Name that tune.

Yankee swap, make Christmas cards for Veterans Homes/Nursing Homes/ Grangers that don't attend meetings very often. Game: decorated stryo balls, toss into a bucket

I: Have a food basket for needy families, roll call on how you celebrate Christmas. Act out the "Night Before Christmas", collect Toys for Tots to donate, rolls call on most memorable Christmas,

M: talk about composers of Christmas carols, sing Christmas carols, invite a Church Choir in to sing.

E: Christmas in other countries, history of poinsettia plants, The Golden Generation tell what happened when they were children, Christmas traditions. Fire Dept. talk on safety around Christmas time. Exchange favorite Christmas recipes.

Subject: trees

R: games, tour Grange Property identifying the trees

I: Poems on trees

M: "Oh Christmas Tree", "Don't Sit Under The Apple Tree With Anyone Else But Me"

E: Learn names of trees, Conservation, planting trees, crafts using leaves

Subject: baseball

R: Bean bag baseball, Who's on first?

I: Casey at the Bat

M: Take Me Out Two the Ball Game (hand out popcorn)

E: History of baseball, double play, cd collection, minor league player give a talk, Quiz- odd facts from statistics or match names of teams and where they are from.

Subject: Halloween

R: apples on a rope, bobbing for apples, bowling with apples

I: all bring wrapped candy and go trick or treating.

M: Monster Mash, Ghost Busters,

E: Halloween safety by Police and/or Fireman

Subject: Farm, Farmer, Farming

R: Farm tour, pin the tail on the animal, Pumpkin guts tug of war- save all the guts place on a trap-then have a tug of war. Cow pie tic-tac-toe, pie (food) eating contest

I: "God Made A Farmer" by Paul Harvey

M: "Old McDonald", "How ya gonna keep the Boys on the Farm"

E: ID apples and veggies, Farmers market, wind farms, nurseries, New Idea Farm, roof top farms, turf farms, CSA's, solar farms

Subject: St. Patrick's Day

R: bring in Irish folk dancers, Toss Chocolate coins into a bucket, bring in a stone to Kiss the Blarney Stone, Leprechaun drawing and/or costume contest, 4 leaf clover scavenger hunt, pot of gold scavenger hunt

I: Irish poems/sayings, Life of St. Patrick, story telling

M: Popular Irish songs

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E: History of Irish food, who has Irish Ancestors, Ireland Culture, if anyone has been to Ireland have them present a slide show and talk about it. Potato famine and Immigration to the United States

Subject: Art

R: scavenger hunt in a piece of art (find objects)

I: Bring in an artist, kids say the darndist things-Art Linkletter

M: Write music or make an instrument, tour an art/music box museum, visit people who make instruments

E: slides of art, galleries, festivals

Subject: Fall

R: pumpkin carving, corn maze, making Halloween costumes, game show-concentration

I: Children's Halloween stories, speaker-Veterans, thanksgiving poetry

M: Harvest Moon, Count your Blessings, Monster Mash

E: Veteran's Day, elections

Subject: Games

R: play games/activities, board games, cards

I: Ask members their favorite games & how they inspired them

M: London Bridge, Ring Around the Rosie

E: history of games and how they changed or stayed the same

Subject: Spring

R: Indoor baseball, guess what a seed will grow to be, plant seeds-extra roll for food shelf

I: Present 1st Degree Ritual w/symbols

M: April Showers, Morning Has Broken, Take Me Out To The Ball Game, Tigger song

E: Plants, pests, coil springs/how many things use springs/history of coil springs

Subject: covered bridges

R: field trip, covered bridge museum, in Bennington, VT

I: spooning at the kissing bridge, Legend of Sleepy Hollow, Robert Frost poems, speakers-restoring covered bridges

M: Bridge over Troubled Waters, Over the river, Bridge over the River Kwai

E: Photos of bridges through the years, Restoration

Subject: flowers

R: game: name the flower, decorate flower pots, plant flowers whether at your hall or in town

I: stories: how flowers got their names, speaker-Master Gardener, Florist

M: ring around the Rosie, Blue Bell

E: Use of flowers; medicine, foods, decorations,

Subject: Waterfalls

R: waterfall yoga pose, Quiz-facts about waterfalls, Niagara Falls

I: stories/poems, slide show-pics to music/meditation

M: Don't go chasing waterfalls, Little Fishes

E: facts about waterfalls, photos of famous waterfalls, furniture

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Subject: Health & fitness

R: exercises you can do while sitting in a chair, twister, walk in a park

I: sponsor a blood drive/blood pressure, Pharmacist talk

M: Dem Bones

E: Read all prescription info, Physical Therapist, Fall Prevention, Breast Cancer awareness (all cancers)

Subject: Family Tradition

R: games families play-mad libs, an old family game, a game your family plays a certain time of year

I: past experiences, Ancestor's encouraging us

M: your favorite family song, nursery rhymes, "Tradition"

E: Tell what your family traditions are, Geneology, your DNA-where did you come from?

“Education is the Key” IDEA LIST

Requirements for “Education is the Key”

Education is the Key to being a Lecturer. As a lecturer, it is your job to educate your members. This can be done by having programs in your own hall, or getting out into the public. You can also invite others into your hall for some of these events. Letting others in the community know that the Grange is alive and well is important and could help you attract new members. So be proud of who you are!

Participate with a **Group of Grangers**

- a “group” is five or more members.
- The group doesn’t have to be the same people at every event.
- Bring along non-members if you like, but they don’t count as part of the group of five Grangers.

[A group is more obvious than one or two members. Also, there is bravery in numbers.]

❖ Wear **Grange clothing or something with a Grange logo.**

Group members should wear a pin, a shirt, a hat or something with “Grange” on it to show they are a group from a Grange. [Have you noticed how a group from the “Red Hat Society” stands out at an event? You want people to say, “What is the Grange?”]

❖ Bring a **Camera** or take pictures with a cell phone. Take a picture with a camera or cell phone (either a group shot or an individual member) that shows where the Grangers are or what is going on.

❖ Print out the pictures (use either photo paper or regular printer paper) and make a collage no larger than half a piece of poster board. That’s 14 X 11 inches or smaller. It is OK to include items like programs and ticket stubs in the collage with the pictures.

❖ Avoid “double dipping.” Hold a supper and hold a fundraiser are two different items, so don’t count the same supper twice.

❖ If some of the “events” (such as a parade) are not available in your area, you could organize such an event and invite the public.

❖ Evaluation: **Collage and reports**

- Turn in your collage and/or your final check list to the State Lecturer by **October 1, 2017**

Photography Contest

Note: We are asking that photographs have a foam board or other rigid backing. They may be matted but not framed.

Categories:

A. Covered Bridges

B. Flowers

C. Family

D. "Four Seasons" (take a picture in the same spot during each of the four seasons. If you don't get them all taken this Grange year, you can hold them over for next year. This category will be the exception to rule 5 below.)

Rules:

1. Only prints are accepted for judging. No slides in any category.
2. Photographer must select the category and class for his/her entry.
3. Participants may enter all categories, using different photographs.
4. Participants may submit only one entry per category.
5. Entries must have been taken between October 1, 2016 and October 1, 2017.
6. Print may be made by a commercial process but photo must have been taken by the entrant personally.
7. Rigid backing (foam board preferred) is requested for all photographs. No frames, please.
8. Entry must not be larger than 16 x 20.
9. Print should be on photo paper.
10. There are three divisions within each category:
 - Division I - Subordinate Members Division II - Junior Members age 5-9
 - Division III - Junior Members age 10-14
11. Small cash prizes will be given to 1st, 2nd, and 3rd in each category and division.
12. Labeling: Each entry should be properly labeled with the photographer's:
 - Name, Grange, Category and Division. (You may use the label provided in this program)
- Judging: Entries due to the State Lecturer by October 1, 2017.

Criteria for judging photographs:

A. Composition and arrangement
B. Interest

C. Presentation
D. Technique

Art Contest

Categories:

- A. Oils & Acrylics
- B. Watercolors
- C. Charcoal, Pastels, Markers and Pencil
- D. Mixed Media (this category is endless!) *For example, a work on canvas that combines paint, ink, and collage materials. It doesn't have to be on canvas. It could be on any background material.*
- E. NEW CATEGORY: Adult Coloring Page. Adult coloring books are all the rage and are a great relaxation and concentration tool. You can find them almost anywhere. You may enter one coloring page, using any type of medium to color: pencils, crayons, markers, gel pens.

Rules:

1. All entries must be the original work of the member
2. All entries must be completed between October 1, 2016 and October 1, 2017.
3. Entries are judged according to the medium used.
4. Pastels, Charcoal and pencil entries must be treated for permanency to stop smudging.
5. Nude entries will not be accepted or displayed.
6. Size must not exceed 24 x 36 including the frame. 3-D objects must not be more than 24 x 36 x 24.
7. All entries must be framed or have a firm backing so they can be properly displayed
8. Non-breakable covering is acceptable. Glass-covered entries will not be judged. Do NOT send any glass with entries.
9. Only one entry per category per person.
10. There are three divisions within each category:

Division I - Subordinate Grange members

Division II - Junior Grange members age 5-9

Division II - Junior Grange members age 10-14

12. Awards: Small cash prizes will be given for the 1st, 2nd, and 3rd place in each category.
13. Labeling: Each entry should be properly labeled with Name, Grange, Division and Category. You can use the labels provided in this program..
14. Judging: Entries are due to the State Lecturer by 3pm on Thursday of State Convention in Oct. of 2017.

Create a Card Contest

This contest gives members the opportunity to create their own all occasion cards. Size of the cards will be **no bigger** than 5 ½ X 8 ½

Categories:

I. Hand Made (Drawn by hand or cut and pasted with materials found in the home rather than commercially prepared.)

II. Computer Generated (Any card using a computer in any way.)

III. Hand Stamped and/or Decorated (with materials available from craft stores)

Classes are as follows:

Class A:	Baby
Class B:	Halloween
Class C:	Anniversary

Division:

Subordinate member

Junior member age 5-9

Junior member age 10-14

1. One entry per person/per class/per category.
2. Labeling: Each entry should be properly labeled with the maker's Name, Grange Category, and Class. You can use the labels provided in this program.
3. Judging: Entries due to the State Lecturer by October 1, 2017.

Entries will be judged on:

1. Creativity
2. Composition
3. Eye Appeal

A small cash prize will be awarded in each category.

Creative Writing Contest

This contest has three different types of writing that you can participate in.

Categories:

I. Poetry – Haiku (An unrhymed Japanese verse) It has 17 syllables in all. 5 on the first line, 7 on the second line and 5 on the third line. They are not rhyming.

Son

(Title)

He's always a joy

Line 1 (5 syllables)

Never sitting a minute

Line 2 (7 syllables)

Makes this mama proud!

Line 3 (5 syllables)

There is only one subject category: Family

II. Tell the Story – “Memories From My School Days”. (500 word limit)

III. Read the Book and answer the following question, “Why Did I Enjoy This Book?” You must read a book; any book, and then answer the question. In 500 words or less, tell why you were impressed or entertained by this book. Try not to give the entire story away.

General Rules:

1. Only one division - Subordinate Members. One entry per person/per category.
2. Length: 500 words. All words in the writings will be counted except as noted in rule three. (Except Haiku)
3. The title(s), even when they are part of the opening sentences of the entry, and author’s identification information are NOT counted.
4. Author’s identification to be placed on the back of the writing(s), including name, address, Grange name and number, and category entered (I, II, III). You may use the entry forms provided in this program.
5. All writings are to be sent to the State Lecturer for judging on or before October 1, 2017.
6. Entries **must be** typed, double-spaced, on 8 1/2” x 11” unlined paper, no designs on the paper, and no backing. **Haiku’s may be typed on a half sheet of paper.** May be placed in a plastic sleeve for protection (optional).

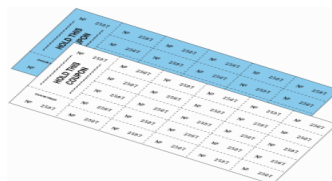
