Grange, sign-a-song winner, Marie Hall of Gilman Grange, public speaking contestant Matt Clark, of Prentice Hill Grange, who also, with his wife, Lynn, served as officers when the youth opened the session on Friday morning. They all did New Hampshire proud!

Trooper of the Year

Each year at the State Grange Celebration Banquet the NH State Grange gives the Trooper of the Year Award to a recipient selected by the NH State Troopers. This year a team was nominated for their work and volunteer hours spent in a 3-year investigation of methamphetamine labs with the final result being conviction of 300 on drug arrests and the closure of three labs. These Troopers took it upon themselves to study the process of illegal drug manufacturing and what common, everyday household items are used and in what quantities. Armed with this knowledge, they began an intelligence data base with information obtained from civilians, local merchants, local police officers and other Troopers which resulted in the final convictions.

The use and production of meth was relatively unheard of in New Hampshire and in most of New England until recent years. In and around the year 2005, there were approximately eighteen methamphetamine labs seized in New England. Twelve of the eighteen were in New Hampshire alone. Of those twelve labs in NH, seven were located in Southern Grafton County and their detection and subsequent seizure was due, in good measure if not directly, to the efforts of these three Troopers. Trooper First Class Peter D. Todd, Trooper Gary A. Prince and Trooper David Appleby were nominated by Sergeant Robert H. Terhune #557 Troop F and agreed upon by Colonel Frederick H. Booth.

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141st National Grange Annual Convention

More than 500 Grange members and rural leaders from across the country were given a warm welcome to Reno, Nevada for their 141st Annual Convention. The week-long celebration, full of workshops, tours, junior & youth events, business meetings, and more all took place at John Ascuaga's Nugget Hotel in suburban Sparks, Nevada.Oregon business executive Edward L. (Ed) Luttrell was elected the 22nd President of the National Grange. Luttrell joins a long line of noted rural business entrepreneurs to lead the nation's oldest national agricultural and rural community organization during its 140-year tenure. In addition, a new slate of national officers was elected.

Past National Master and First Lady Inducted into Vermont Agricultural Hall of Fame

The Vermont Farm Bureau inducted five new members into its Agricultural Hall of Fame on August 29th, 2007. Two of those members were Past National Grange Master Kermit Richardson and his wife, Margaret. They were honored for their significant contributions to rural life in the state of Vermont. Between them, Kermit and Margaret have 120 years of service to their local Grange, Riverside Grange #455 in West Topsham, Vermont.

Margaret Richardson spoke to Jack Hurston from WCAX News about farmers being the backbone of Vermont. She said, "They are a precious breed of people. They are committed to what they do. And they believe in it. They know if it wasn't for a farmer, we wouldn't be eating this meal today."

Kermit and Margaret both served as Masters of the Vermont State Grange, Kermit from 1970 to 1974, and Margaret from 1984 to 1991. Margaret paved the way by being the first Lady Master for the Vermont State Grange. Prior to these positions, they were selected as the 1957 Vermont State Grange Young Couple of the Year.

Kermit took leadership roles in the National Grange as Chaplain, Lecturer, and Overseer, which eventually culminated in his election as the 20th Master of the National Grange in 1995. In addition to his work through the Grange, Kermit also served several terms as a member of the Vermont State Legislature.

This is the fifth year that the Vermont Farm Bureau have honored individuals for their Agricultural Hall of Fame. Vt. Gov. James H. Douglas was on hand to make the presentation of a framed print of a Champlain Valley farm by artist Deborah Holmes to the new members and or their family.
