Time to File Your Grange's Annual IRS Tax Return

This is a reminder to all Granges in NH that your fiscal year ended September 30, 2013 and now you have until February 15, 2014 to file your annual 990-N electronic tax return with the IRS. Failure to file for three consecutive years can result in a loss of your non-profit status. One change to the 990-N report this year is the amount of money earned. It has been raised from \$25,000 to \$50,000. So if your Grange has less than \$50,000 income you may file the 990-N report on line. The receipt you print upon completion of filing has also changed slightly.

If your Grange is unable to file on line, you may contact Dan for a paper copy of the 2010 990-EZ form, and he will mail one to you. The paper version changes every year so you must use the 2012 form this year. The paper version is also due to the IRS by February 15, 2014.

Manchester Community Grange Helps Feed the Homeless

New Horizons is an emergency homeless shelter, soup kitchen, and food pantry in downtown Manchester. In September, they received a massive donation: a greenhouse built on the adjoining vacant lot, including beds, soil, and seeds. They already have hundreds of volunteers on call, but don't know anything about running a greenhouse. Manchester Community Grange #359 has stepped up to bridge the gap.

Sister Emily Sandblade has gardened in her backyard for decades, and is an active Master Gardener with the UNH Cooperative Extension. She is providing the knowledge and drive to get things organized and started. A half-dozen other Manchester Patrons are pitching in a few hours a week. Because they're starting late in the year, they are beginning with cold-resistant crops including spinach, peas, lettuce, and onions. As they improve the setup and procedures, they plan to provide 70% of the soup kitchen's daily vegetables. New Horizons' carpenter is building a new compost bin every week or so, and will add more beds when there is room.



Raymond was born in Burlington, Vt., on Aug. 13, 1939, to Stephen J. and Natalie (Hill) Burton. He attended the Bath Village School, then graduated from Woodsville High School, Class of 1958. Following his high school graduation, he earned his Bachelor Degree in Education from Plymouth State College in 1962. As an educator, he taught for a short time in Andover and as a teaching principal at the Warren Village School and Springfield College.

In his public life, Raymond will forever be known for his lifelong dedication to the people of New Hampshire, particularly the residents of the North Country, whom he continuously served as Executive Councilor for District 1 since 1981. Councilor Burton attended functions throughout his District and belonged to multiple committees and organizations, including the Grafton Kane Masonic Lodge # 46 of North Haverhill; Chairman of the Bath Town Republican Committee, Clerk of the Grafton County Board of Commissioners, member of the Governor's Highway Advisory Council, member of the Grafton County Conservation District, member of the NH Farm Bureau, member of the Pine Grove Grange (7th Degree), and a member of the United Church of Christ in Bath.

It's "Curtains" for Blazing Star Grange in 2014

Danbury's historic Grange hall is home to a remarkable, one-of-a-kind treasure. Organized in 1875, Blazing Star Grange's hall was eventually built in 1911, featuring a large main room for meetings and performances. By 1922, the stage had a full set of three scenic curtains and a 'grand drape', as well as 'ears', wings and teasers.

What makes this set so outstanding is that it was produced by New Hampshire—born Arthur Egbert Foster in his studio in Manchester, and probably shipped by train to Danbury, where it was permanently installed.

"Finding an entire set of backdrops, teasers, wings and flats is rare", said Chris Hadsel, director of Vermont's Curtains Without Borders, at an initial meeting Oct 27 at the Grange Hall. Although Foster produced other work in NH, Maine and Massachusetts, only one other curtain, in Deerfield, has been located in the state.

Curtains often included a scene of a town's local interest. The Grange's "country scene" depicts what is believed to be a view of Mt. Kearsarge, while the "Springtime" drape, pictured above, depicts a locally known home beside a river.

The set includes an advertising curtain painted in the 1930s in a bold and structural style, using primary colors, by another artist. Featured on it are the names of businesses in the vicinity of Danbury in a "downtown" street scene, with an airborne blimp painted with another advertisement.

Throughout 2014, the Grange will be hosting informational meetings with the additional purpose of gathering helpers and sponsors for the restoration of these pieces of historical artwork.

It still amazes me that the New Hampshire State Grange held their annual session so close to Christmas. I realize Christmas is celebrated much differently today than in 1903, but I just can't imagine being a delegate in 2013 to a State Grange Session held two weeks before Christmas. The 1903 session was held at Phoenix Hall in Concord. Many Grange functions were held in Phoenix Hall. The building still stands, but it lacks the handicapped access required for modern functions.

The State Secretary reported several Granges organized in 1903: Pine Grove Grange of Bath on January 2 with 36 charter members; Parker Mountain Grange of Strafford Center on February 11 with 54 charter members; Fidelity Grange of South Hampton on February 12 with 35 charter members; Batchelder Grange in South Manchester on March 4, with 76 charter members; East Candia Grange on March 12, with 41 charter members. It was unfortunate that Dustin Island Grange of Concord surrendered their charter.

The total number of Subordinate members as of September 30 was 26,800. There were 16 Granges who had 200 members or more: Hudson, 200; Derryfield of Manchester, 203; Granite of Milford 206; Warner and Lebanon, 207 each; before taking up their work as teachers new Granges organized being Mt. Croy-Winnipesaukee, 209; Dover, 230; Nashua, 235; Rochester, 234; Morning Star of Lyme, 236; Pembroke, 240; Capitol of Concord with 257; Cheshire of Keene with 259; White Mountain of Littleton with 298; and Amoskeag of Manchester with 435 members. Wow!
