



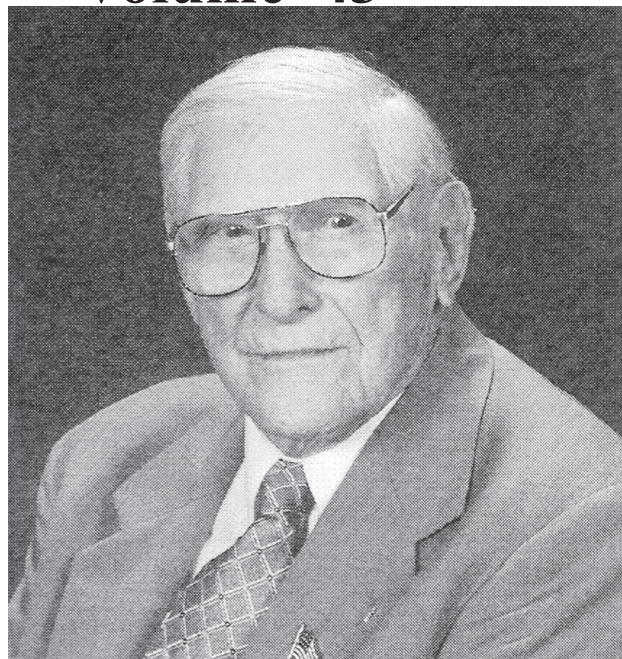

**John L. Saturley**

**July 21, 1917 – Mary 13, 2013**

**Past Master of the New Hampshire State Grange**

John was the son of the late Howard and Ella (Hutchinson) Saturley. One of seven siblings, John was predeceased by 2 brothers and 3 sisters, Howard, Lester, Margaret, Florence, and Lois.

He graduated from Pembroke Academy in 1935 and the Concord College of Business in 1937. Mr. Saturley spent 45 years with Concord Lumber, moving his way up the ladder, until his retirement as general manager. During that time he served as president of the NH Retail Lumbermen's Association.

He was a member of the First Congregational Church of Pembroke and served at various times as teacher, Deacon, and Trustee. In addition he was Moderator for the State UCC.

Mr. Saturley was very involved in civic affairs. He was a member of the Pembroke School Board for 15 years, including some as chairman, and then was elected to the position of School District Moderator, serving for 9 years. He was also President of the NH School Boards Association for 2 years. He spent several years as Trustee of Pembroke Academy and had been appointed a trustee to the

University of NH by Gov. Walter Peterson, spending 4 years as chairman of the school's Agricultural Committee.

He had been a member of the Pembroke Budget Committee. In 1986, he was honored as Citizen of the Year in the Town of Pembroke.

A member of the Concord Rotary Club, Mr. Saturley had 20 years of perfect attendance and was awarded the Paul Harris Fellowship Recognition. He was also a 55 year members of the Odd Fellows and was instrumental in building the addition to the Odd Fellows Home in Concord.

Joining at age 14, Mr. Saturley was an 82-year member of Pembroke Grange #111. He was a Past Master of Pembroke Grange and of Suncook Valley Pomona. He was Master of the NH State Grange from 1967 -1971. He also served as National Grange Priest Archon. In addition, John was involved with the 4-H Foundation and the International Farm Youth Exchange (IFYE).

John enjoyed gardening, and was a baseball and basketball fan. He and his wife Doris loved to travel, crossed the country several times, and had reached their goal of visiting all 50 state capitals.

Mr. Saturley was the widower of Florence (Allen) Saturley, who died in 1959, and Doris (Fowler) (McCully) Saturley, who died in 2011. He was also predeceased by a son, Neil McCully, and a daughter-in-law, Judy Saturley.

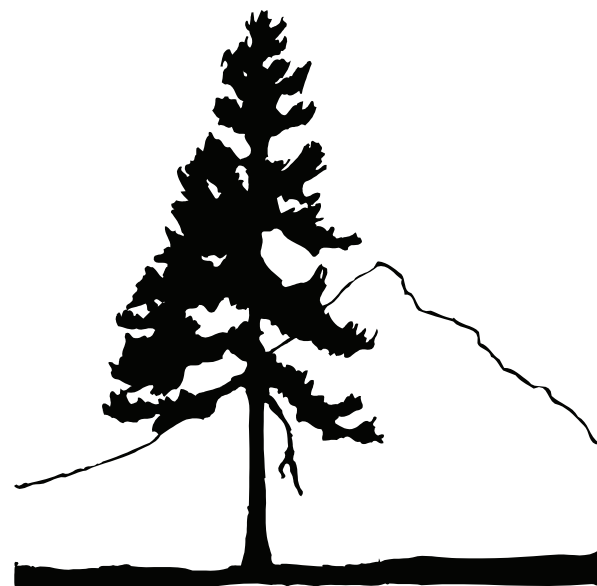

**State Grange Historian  
Richard Patten**



I have been pleased with the amount of calls I am getting from people looking for records of Granges that used to be in their community. These people are looking for information about their relatives who belonged to Grange at one time, and they want to know when the Grange disbanded in their town. I appreciate Hannah West and Anne Louise & Marty Boisvert bringing the records of various closed Granges to me.

So far, Union Grange of Hopkinton, Ossipee Mountain Grange, Mountain View Grange, and Lake Grange records have been loaned to historical societies in their towns. These records have been in the basement of the State Grange Building in Hooksett. I am currently working on Fremont Grange and Dover Grange to find new homes for their records. It is amazing the stories I am hearing from the people who have received the records. They had heard the Grange was a major part of the town but never realized how much the Grange did.

I am currently researching Concord (formerly Pineconia ) Grange's records in preparation for the 100th anniversary next year. It is just amazing what they accomplished.

I was reading the 1913 State Grange Journal of Proceedings to see what was happening when the National Session was last held in New Hampshire. The National Grange convened on November 12, 1913 at Mechanics Hall, Manchester, NH. Mrs. Esther Pattee was serving as National Ceres with State Master Richard Pattee as delegate. This would be their final session as delegates representing New Hampshire as new state officers would be elected in December.

There were three thousand and six Grange members receiving the lessons of the Degree of Ceres or seventh degree. New Hampshire had 2,908 patrons receiving the seventh degree with Massachusetts having 1,616 patrons in the degree class. There were three degree

conferrals (at 12:30 p.m., 3:30 p.m. and 8 p.m.) to handle the large class.

The National Grange Memorial Service paid a high tribute to Oliver H. Kelley, the last original Founder of the Order who had passed away that year.

Here is a little more history about the New Hampshire State Session in 1913. State Master Wesley Adams spoke about the need of State Officers visiting Pomona and Subordinate Granges. However, money for travel was not available. The current treasury in 1913 was \$29,000 with the State Master and State Lecturer each getting \$400 dollars for a salary with traveling expenses when traveling away from home. The State Master was asking for a study to be done to increase compensation so increased traveling can be accomplished. He also spoke about Granges in the state assisting the GAR or Grand Army of the Republic to decorate the graves for Memorial Day. He stressed the Grange needs to be ready to do this if the GAR is unable to continue.

The State Master also reminded members it was the custom of the State Master to issue a proclamation naming a certain day as Children's Day. He was urging that the State Grange itself give recognition to this matter by naming some day in the year which shall be Children's Day in all the Granges in the state. [Perhaps this could be a possible bill for the State Representatives in the Grange to file for the 2014 Legislators to consider.]

State Master Adams spoke at length about the creation of a State Highway Department. He said the development of farm life depends largely upon suitable, cheap, easy means of transportation of commodities to and from the farm. The agriculture of the state demands a system of highway improvement. He continued by saying the State of New Hampshire must go into the road business. The Grange should vigorously demand establishment of such a department and should oppose to the limit the further hodgepodge, you help me and I'll help you system of development sure to come unless immediate and effective action is taken.

I need to continue this topic in the next issue. It is very interesting. It gives us as legislators something to think about.

**Home Grown Politics**

I hope you all are thinking about resolutions for our state session. They are due about September first. Please think about legislation that you would like to see pursued at both the state and federal level. Remember, it was Grange resolutions that were the push needed to start the NH State Police and at the federal level the creation of Rural Free Delivery.

I would ask Subordinate Granges to write letters to the House Environment and Agriculture Committee in Support of HB 110, which was retained in Committee and will be worked on in August. The Wording of HB 110 is:

"If you witness cruelty to livestock, or poultry, you have a duty to report it to law enforcement with Jurisdiction within 48 hours. If you have evidence of the crime of cruelty, you have the same duty to report that you have the evidence to the same law enforcement authority at the same time. If the evidence is a photo or video you must keep an unedited copy for 60 days."

The State Grange and the National Grange have endorsed the cruelty bill with written letters to the committee. Your State Grange also opposed SB 159 which would have eliminated the use of gestation crates. Our State Master and I wrote letters and made phone calls to the Governor's Council to support the re-nomination of Lorraine Merrill for Commissioner of the Department of Agriculture Markets and Food.

I am not able to go to the Legislative Fly-In this year. I am disappointed, but the State Master will be there to capably represent New Hampshire. I again encourage folks to make the trip to DC for the Fly-In some time. It is a great experience that you will never forget. I cannot go because that same week I will be flying to Vancouver for the annual meeting of State Agriculture and Rural Leaders. Tara Sad from the Legislative Department and the current Chair of the House

Environment and Agriculture Committee will be at the annual meeting in British Columbia as well.

I would love to hear from folks about their gardens. I have mine planted with mostly herbs, also a variety of hot peppers and onions and even a few strawberries. I just love going out with scissors while I am cooking to cut some herbs for the meal.

I continue to be the Grange Representative to the NH Farm Bureau's Government Affairs Committee and their Policy Committee. We need to do more to bring the Farm Bureau, The NH State Grange and other agriculture organizations closer together and working for the same causes.

That reminds me to ask you all to get out this year and buy CSA shares, visit your local farmers' market and local farm stands. Start planning now to go to the Big E this year for Grange Day on September 22, and stay to march in the parade. I would really like to see at least two folks from each Subordinate Grange in New Hampshire marching that day. Bring a sash and help us celebrate Grange Day at the fair.

Take a photo of your entries and send the photo to me. You may make an award to praise them in their decorating. They will also be judged at State level. 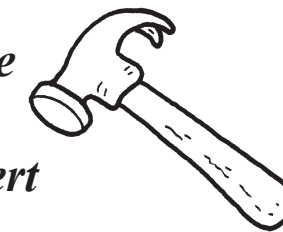

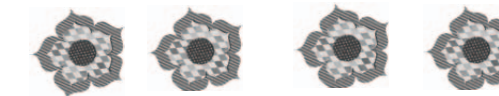
#### Aurora Grange

**NH State Grange  
Trustees of Trust Funds  
Financial Aid Available Now**

Do you know that the State Grange can use income earned from the Trust Fund to provide financial assistance to members who may be in need?

The applicant must require some form of financial assistance or aid for their personal care, comfort, welfare and well being or that of their immediate family.

The request for assistance could be to help pay for hearing aids, eyeglasses, dentures, medical bills or one of a number of other reasons.

The application forms are available on the NH State Grange website [www.nhgrange.org](http://www.nhgrange.org) or you may contact any of the Trustees or Grange Services Committee members for assistance with the paperwork. Your Grange Secretary or Master should have a Roster listing the members and their contact information. Some of the guidelines for applying are listed below but check the actual paperwork for complete details.

1. The applicant must be a member of the Grange for at least two (2) consecutive years in a NH State Subordinate Grange.
2. The applicant must be in good standing in his/her Grange. The good standing should be verified by current dues card or by a Golden Sheaf card if applicable.
3. The applicant must require some form of financial assistance or aid for their personal care, comfort, well being or that of their immediate family. Currently assistance may be up to \$500 per fiscal year if funds are available.
4. A letter of recommendation must accompany all applications and should give as many facts as possible about the person in need. Please specify your relationship to the applicant.
5. If the request is for money, a financial assistance application must be completed and signed by the applicant. If the money is to be used to purchase an item such as hearing aids, eyeglasses, etc., a signed estimate of the cost from the doctor or provider must accompany the financial application. If the money is needed for another purpose written estimates or actual copies of bills must be accompany the application.

6. All of the required paperwork must be completed as thoroughly as possible and all letters of recommendation, letters of good standing, or copies of dues cards and estimates or copies of bills must be included before mailing to the Trustees of Trust Funds. This will help to ensure a timely processing of the request. All applications must be reviewed by the Trustees of Trust Funds.

7. Your application is confidential and your name will not be revealed in any reports made to the State Grange. This is not charity - this fund was established by Grangers like you to aid their brothers and sisters in time of need.

8. The request may take up to ninety (90) days from the receipt of the completed application to the Trustees Secretary. Completed financial aid requests should be submitted to: Secretary of Trustees of Trust Funds, Rhoda Davis, 317 Route 129, Loudon, NH 03307.

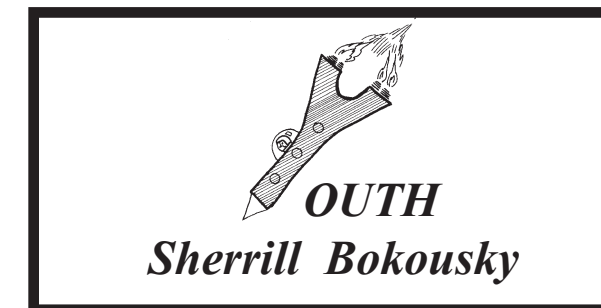

Camilie Twiss read a short bio of George's Grange journey and told of him as a three-year-old performing the salutation correctly along with his father who was Master at the time.

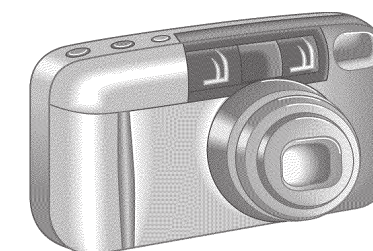

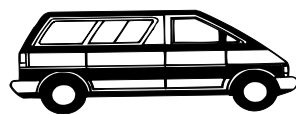

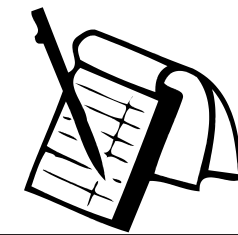
