Pomona Grange Decision

At State Session the delegate body acted upon the recommendation of the Pomona Study Committee concerning the restructuring of Pomona districts. This recommendation was to close the existing eight Pomonas as of December 31st, 2020. The Pomonas would distribute the monies in their treasury to the Granges within their jurisdiction.

Then between January 1st, 2021, and June 30th, 2021, three new Pomona Granges would be formed. The three new districts would be as follows; A line starting at the Massachusetts border in Nashua, at Route 3, going north to Concord, then continuing north on Rt. 93 to Tilton would divide the southern part of the state into two sections. Another line from the Vermont border at Lebanon going east through Tilton, to the Maine border would divide the state into three parts.

This recommendation was made into a motion and was passed. I along with the Executive Committee will provide some guidelines for the Pomonas going forward to prepare for this change. It is also my hope that the State Master, General Deputy, and Pomona Deputy will facilitate the organizational meetings for these new Pomonas.

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

FUDGE BROWNIES

1 cup unsalted butter 1 Tbsp. vanilla extract 2 1/4 cups sugar 4 large eggs 1 1/4 cups baking cocoa 1 ½ cups flour ½ tsp. salt 2 cups chocolate chips 1 tsp. baking powder

Preheat oven to 350 degrees. Lightly grease a 9"x13" pan. In a medium sized bowl, melt butter in microwave. Add sugar, stir to combine. Return to microwave briefly until it's hot but not bubbling, it will be shiny when you stir it. Transfer to mixing bowl, stir in cocoa, salt, baking powder and vanilla. Add the eggs, beat until smooth. Add flour and chips, mix until combined. Spoon into pan and bake 30 minutes or until a cake tester inserted into the center comes out dry. Let pan cool for 5 minutes, then loosen the edges with a table knife. Cool completely before cutting and serving. Yield: 2 dozen brownies.

Another NH State Grange Session has come and gone. I was pleased to present Mrs. Patricia Adams with a bronze Grange marker for Past State Master Carl S. Adams' gravesite.

Since the Session, I received a cal from Rhoda Hardy who belonged to Ezekiel Webster Grange. She brought to me a long, framed photograph of the 1929 State Grange Session. I am not sure where it was held as there is no writing, but what a crowd!

I also received photographs, newspaper clippings, and colored framed pictures of the State Officers following an Installation of Officers. Past Master B. Franklin Hayes was the Master with the slate of officers surrounding him. They included: State Overseer, Philip Shattuck; State Lecturer, Everett Poore; State Steward, Ervin Buttrick; State Assistant Steward, Philip Estes; State Lady Assistant Steward, Joanne Anderson Brandt; State Chaplain, Rev. Arlington Wry; State Treasurer, George Currier; State Secretary Wayne Ingalls; State Gatekeeper, William Geralds; State Ceres, Mrs. Virginia Hayes; State Pomona, Mrs. Ruth Gray; State Flora, Mrs. Marion Jones; State Executive Committee, John L. Saturley, E Norris Hall, Carl S Adams, Cora French, and Alton Carpenter (not pictured); and State Pianist, Mrs. Elizabeth Webster. As I look at this photograph I realize Joanne Brandt and Wayne Ingalls are the only ones left

In a newspaper clipping that was given to me I read that on August 29, 1941, Lebanon Grange met with Master Carl S. Adams presiding. A corn roast was decided to be held on Sunset Rock, Thursday evening, and on August 28 a bird program was featured with members talking about their favorite birds or interesting experiences with birds, and an Address on Birds by Edward Strong. It was announced the Lebanon Grange Auxiliary would meeet on Monday, September 1st. I still have not found in the journals what the Grange Auxiliary did for proj-

I was also given a portion of the Milford Cabinet and Wilton Journal for May 19, 1993. This newspaper featured Hillsborough County Pomona on their 110th anniversary. There were two full pages featuring photographs and memories by members along with history of the organization. One photo featured Pomona Master John Tessier leading the Pledge of Allegiance in the opening ceremony. Another photo showed all the people who attended this meeting. The Salem Singers and Dancers entertained on the program. There was another photograph featuring the full Pomona Court with Pomona Caroline Tessier, attendant Thelma Taylor, Flora Alice Briggs, attendant Ida Caldwell, Pomona Elizabeth Dustin with attendant Sherrill Bokousky, and Sidney Standish, attendant.

They had another photograph of Gerald Leclerc as Assistant Steward and Francine Leclerc as Lady Assistant Steward with Brookline Junior Grange Master Rachel Bailey presenting the colors. There is another photograph of Leonard Twiss, Patron for Brookline Junior Grange; Sandra Bokousky, and Melina Burton as Junior Grange Assistant Steward and Lady Assistant Steward. The article also featured photographs of Alice Briggs, Earl Fitch, and Carl Holland.

Also in this folder were several programs for the Pomona and Subordinate Granges detailing the required work for Grange District Prizes. I have 1914, 1921. 1923, 1924, 1926, and a program for the 26th annual session for the NH State Grange December 19, 1899 at Phenix Hall in Concord. The session ran from December 19 to December 21,

The final item I was found was a bill presented by the Grange to the New Hampshire House of Representatives and State Senate in 1899. The bill was called "Equalize The School, Privileges of the Cities, and Towns in the State." I will be talking about this one in the coming year.

I would like to thank Cam Twiss and Patricia Adams for giving me these items. They are so interesting and will give me a lot to talk about in future articles.
